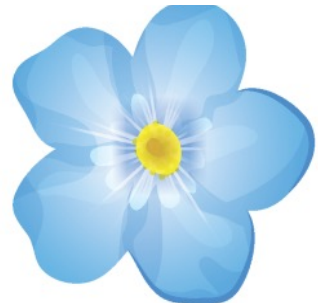

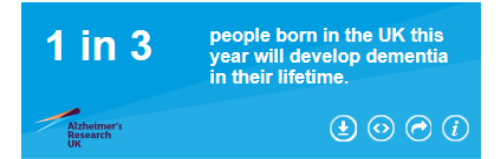

Key benefits of the Dementia Safeguarding Scheme

- Safeguards some of the most vulnerable members of society.
- Reduces demand on policing and partner services.
- Collaborative working with partners including charities, NHS, GPs, other Forces.
- Provides real time savings.
- Utilizes technology effectively.
- Increases trust and confidence in policing.
- Showcases UK policing on an international stage.

Overview of Dementia in the UK

- In the UK, Dementia is one of the most significant conditions affecting older population
- Predicted estimates:
 - 2025: 1 million+ people
 - 2051: 2 million+ people



- Estimated 850,000 people in the UK have dementia, less than 50% receive a formal diagnosis.
- Worldwide prevalence over 24 million people.
- The likelihood of developing dementia becomes greater the older a person is > 1.3% of people in the UK aged 65–69 have dementia, rising to 20% over 85 years.
- 62% of people living with dementia in the UK are female and 38% male.
- As populations in both developed and developing countries are ageing rapidly, the number of people with dementia will increase, making it one of the most important public health issues.
- Alzheimers is the most common dementia type in the UK 62%, Vascular dementia 17%, 10% Mixed Dementia. Lewy Body 4%, Frontotemporal and Parkinson's 2%, Less common Alcohol induced, Syphilis, Prion disease.





Prof Michael Hornberger, from UEA's Norwich Medical School, said: "People with dementia getting lost or going missing is a problem worldwide. Around 70 percent of people with dementia may go missing at least once, with some at risk of going missing multiple times.

"Around 40,000 people with dementia go missing for the first time every year in the UK – and this figure is likely to grow with the projected increase in the dementia population.

2015 Dementia Safeguarding Scheme is launched utilizing GPS technology to allocate tracking devices to most at-risk people.

Key issues identified were:

- Funding
- Reputational risk from media
- Longevity of scheme
- Public and charitable support

Response:

- Stage 1 (2015-16)
 - Funding: Bristol Dementia charity
 - 15 devices force-wide for 12 months
 - Strict referral criteria: most at risk allocated device
 - Designated mailbox for referrals
 - Basic GPS pendant monitored by NHS call centre

- Formation of force-wide Avon & Somerset Dementia Forum
- New funding stream through PCC community fund





Stage 2 (2017-2018)

- New supplier: Bristol Careline
- Doubling devices to 30
- Missing person specialist to assess nominations
- Photograph/description added (with consent) to police intelligence system
- Promotional videos produced, local officers deliver GPS device

- Online location access by NOK
- Reduced demand on police call centre: NOK don't have to wait for missing episode to develop

Distribution

- Initial distribution of the first 750 wristbands was via applications to Avon Fire & Rescue for a home safety visit.

- *The protocol is named after a war veteran of the Normandy landings named George Herbert, who lived with dementia in a care home. Mr Herbert went missing and sadly died while searching for his childhood home.*



2021: EXPANSION of the Dementia Safeguarding Scheme



Funding from Western Power, Bristol Water and Wessex Water to purchase the entirety of the new wristbands.

Benefits


Greater coverage of the entire force area (rather than just the “Avon” area).

Combined the application for the NFC assistance device with registering for the **Herbert Protocol**.

Additional funding obtained which allowed the **purchase of a further 2,000 NFC assistance wristbands**.

The increased quantity allowed **distribution to support groups, hospitals, charities and other forces wishing to carry out a trial**.

- Introduction of on-line Herbert Protocol/DSS form.
- In-force digital services utilised to create a coded form which is received by enquiry office staff.
- Believed to be one of the first forces which stores the document electronically for instant access in the case of a Missing episode

- On-line applications are received by Enquiry Office staff and processed at all of our 25 enquiry offices force-wide.

A record is then created on Niche and Webstorm which means there is instant access to vital data if the person registered is reported missing, such as:

- Former addresses
- Places frequented
- Photos
- Medications
- Former places of work

How to programme the NFC Assistance Device.

Step 1



First, download the "NFC Tools" app onto your mobile phone. *Some older Apple phones won't allow read/write with NFC. Most Android phones will work.



Hello,

Thank you for taking the time to register for the Dementia Safeguarding Scheme (also known as the Herbert Protocol). The information provided will be very useful in assisting us with our search if the person registered becomes a missing person.

I am pleased to enclose the **NFC (Near Field Communication) enabled device** which you requested during your application. The devices are waterproof, do not require any maintenance or charging and are very robust.

The wristband is usually worn like a watch but could be attached to other items such as a walker.

The hangtag can be attached to the lanyard or looped onto items such as a zip, button hole, keys or walking stick.

The NFC assistance device is intended to allow a member of the emergency services, or a member of the public, to scan the wristband or hangtag and contact the registered next of kin, if the wearer is in need of assistance. For this reason, I advise that it is worn in a prominent position.

I have enclosed a simple step-by-step guide on how to programme the NFC device. This shouldn't take you any more than 5 minutes and can be done through an NFC app, available for free download, on most Android enabled devices.

Please ensure that the wristband or hangtag is programmed before it is given to the wearer; the device is only able to provide assistance if it contains the relevant information and contact for the next of kin.

Please note, the wristband and hangtag are not tracking devices and will not allow us to locate the wearer remotely. The NFC devices are passive devices which can be worn daily.

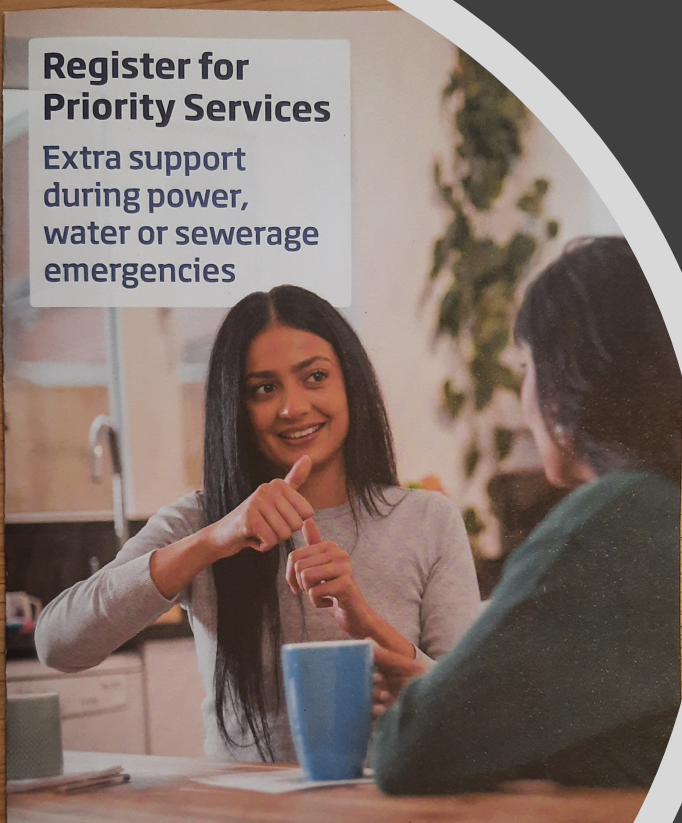
Finally, I would like to invite you to visit the Facebook support group called the 'Avon and Somerset Dementia Forum'. This is a collective of many of the Dementia support groups across Avon and Somerset region and you may find it useful for further support and information.

The Dementia Safeguarding Scheme (Herbert Protocol) is a national scheme encouraging carers, family and friends to provide useful information which can be used in the event of a vulnerable person going missing or in need of assistance. The information is captured in a form and is used by the police to help locate vulnerable individuals.

How to register and request a wristband or hangtag





You can register for the Dementia Safeguarding Scheme via the Avon and Somerset Police website. Simply scan the QR code below or search 'Avon and Somerset Dementia' in your web browser.


When you register, you can request a wearable wristband or hangtag device which stores electronic information about the wearer, such as their name and next of kin. The device will be scanned by emergency services if the individual is found lost or in distress.

Supporting independent living for those living with dementia

Gwent Police becomes the first police force in Wales to adopt a scheme which gives those people living with dementia the support they need.



The dementia wristband scheme means emergency service workers can easily identify and get the right help and support for those living with the condition.

As part of a pilot over 80 local residents will be offered the band which will link care providers with emergency service workers.

Ahead of the launch, Chief Inspector Stephanie Blakemore said:

"Living with dementia is often scary and leaves you feeling lonely."

"When someone with dementia requires help from emergency service practitioners, it requires a vast amount of work to gather all the information to correctly care for that person."

"The wristband visually informs the public, emergency service workers and other care providers that the individual is living with dementia."

This scheme bolsters the Herbert Protocol which Gwent Police alongside the other Welsh forces support. The scheme provides valuable information on anyone living dementia and other neurological conditions.

The protocol provides emergency service workers with information on medication, contact information, frequently visited places and a recent photograph.

Police in Argyll and Bute aim to launch an initiative to help residents suffering from dementia.

Officers want to be able to issue a 'dementia safeguarding tag' by the end of next month to people living with the condition, enabling them to be safely returned home if necessary.

When tapped against a mobile phone, the tag is designed to display the person's name, home town and an emergency contact.

The tags are part of the Herbert Protocol, which was launched in the area in the summer of 2021 and has been well received.

Police Scotland said here had been an increase in incidents of people living with dementia who had been out in their community and become distressed, confused or disorientated, often in cafes, shops or on public transport.



Over £9,000 of funding for devices to help people living with dementia

We've secured over £9,000 of external funding to buy GPS tracking devices for people with dementia who are at risk of becoming a missing person.

This will enable us to increase the number of people we support through our [Dementia Safeguarding Scheme](#), which is now in its seventh year.

Over £7,000 of the funding came from Bristol Water and Wessex Water. An additional £2,000 to buy further Near Field Communication (NFC) devices has also come from Bristol Water and Wessex Water, along with Western Power Distribution.

The 30 GPS trackers will be supplied by Somerset-based company, MindMe and will be allocated through referrals from our three specialist Missing Person

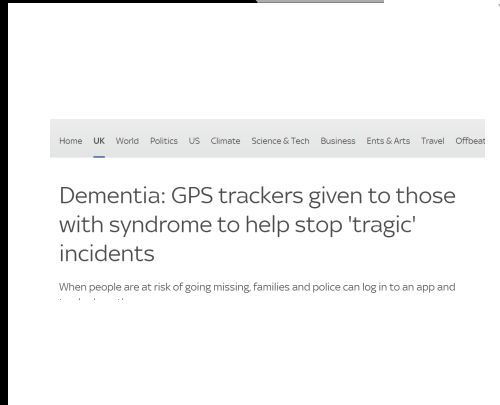
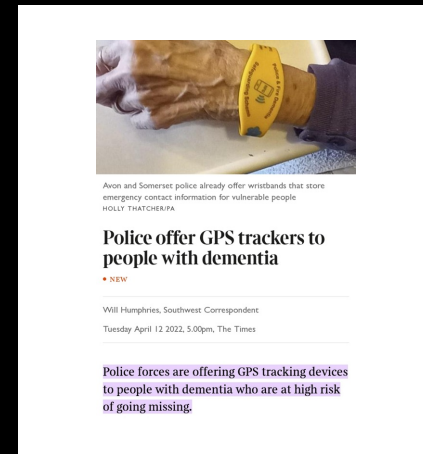

The Dementia Safeguarding Scheme (Herbert Protocol) is a national scheme encouraging carers, family and friends to provide useful information which can be used in the event of a person living with dementia going missing or who is in need of assistance. The information is captured in a form and is used by the police to help locate vulnerable individuals living with dementia.

Register for the scheme now and request a **FREE** wristband, hangtag and lanyard which help safeguard people with dementia.

How to register and request a suitable device


You can register for the Dementia Safeguarding Scheme via the Avon and Somerset Police website. Simply scan the flower QR code below or search 'Avon and Somerset Dementia' in your web browser.

When you register, you can request a wearable wristband, hangtag and lanyard device which stores electronic information about the wearer, such as their name and next of kin. The device can be scanned by emergency services, or a person assisting them. If the individual is found lost or in distress.

Police effectiveness, efficiency and legitimacy

An inspection of Avon and Somerset Constabulary

The constabulary problem-solves well with partner organisations to protect the vulnerable and reduce demand

We found the constabulary works effectively with a wide partnership of agencies to [protect the vulnerable](#) and reduce demand. One of many good examples of this involved the constabulary working with the local authority, health service, fire and rescue service and a dementia charity. This group set about safeguarding a group of people with dementia. Financial support was obtained from the private sector to purchase tracking equipment. This helped relatives of those with dementia, and others who may find them, to return them to safety without any police intervention. This initiative almost completely diverted demand away from police officers but more importantly protected some of the most vulnerable from harm.

March 2023

A further £5,832 funding has been secured with Bristol Water and Wessex Water to continue the GPS allocation for a further 12 months.
